Make & Take

Book Title: Birds by Kevin Henkes

Themes or Topics to use it with: Birds

Summary of program: Explore different kinds of birds. Discuss their shapes, colors and sizes.

Stories that also work with this book/topic:

<u>Chicken, Chicken, Duck!</u> by Nadia Krilanovich <u>Vulture View</u> by April Pulley Sayre <u>Birds and Their Nests</u> by Linda Tagliaferro <u>A Baby Duck Story</u> by Martha E. H. Rustad

Songs and Fingerplays:

A Robin

When a robin cocks his head (*Tilt head to side*)
Sideways in a flower bed
He can hear a tiny sounds
Of a worm beneath the ground. (*Make wiggly worm motion.*)

Once I Saw a Little Bird

Once I saw a little bird

Go hop, hop, hop. (Extend left arm and let forefinger and middle finger of the right hand make hopping motions to the tip of the fingers.)

And I cried, "Little bird,

Will you stop, stop, stop?"

I was going to the window

To say "How-do-you-do,"

And far away he flew. (Wiggle thumb of one hand. Make fluttering motion with fingers.)

Paper Plate Birds

<u>Materials Needed</u>: Paper plate – one for each bird, pencils, scissors, glue, crayons, and construction paper

<u>Directions:</u> Fold the paper plate in half. Open up the plate. Draw a light bulb shape in the middle on the top half of the plate. The light bulb shape top should be along the top of the plate. The bottom of the light bulb shape should be a little below the fold. Erase the part of the peanut shape that goes below the fold. Cut along the remaining lines of the light bulb t shape. Fold down each wing created on each side of the light bulb. Have kids decorate bird by adding legs and beak made from construction paper, coloring the birds and drawing in eyes.

Bird Tracks

Materials Needed: Straws, scissors, paint, paper

<u>Directions:</u> Cut one end of the straw in half – making the cut about an inch long. Then cut the two halves again – creating 4 flaps. Snip off one of the flaps. Fold the remaining 3 flaps out. Dip the flap end in paint. Make prints on the paper.

Activities or Games:

Building Nests

Set out small paper plates and a variety of nesting materials – small sticks, long, skinny strips of paper, paper leaf cut outs or small silk leaves, small lengths of yarn or string. Encourage children to build a nest on their plate. You can have them glue the pieces together to take home or have it be a sensory table project.

Snacks:

<u>Little Chick Snacks</u> – Have kids eat some of a chick's favorite foods. Mix dry cereal such as corn or rice chex, dried cherries or blueberries and sunflower seeds. Optional - Add a gummi worm!

Themes or Topics to use it with: Food, Eating, Healthy Choices

Summary of program: Discuss food, eating and healthy choices while learning new vocabulary from the identification of foods and the verbs that can describe the process.

Sandwich Books

<u>Materials Needed</u>: Thin cardboard, light brown paper (grocery bags work great) assorted construction paper scraps, pencils, scissors, stapler, crayons are optional

<u>Directions:</u> Use the cardboard to create a stencil in the shape of a slice of bread and about that size. Have kids use the stencil to trace 2 bread slices on the brown paper. Next the child cuts out the slices. Then have children cut out fillings or pages for their book. You might suggest cutting out cheese slices, pickle slices or vegetables such as tomato slices, or lettuce leaves. When they have cut out their pages, help them put them in the order they wish between the two slices of bread. Help them staple the pages with two staples at the top of the bread. Children may wish to color on their pages with the crayons. Encourage them to read you the "story" of their sandwich book by turning the pages and telling you about each.

Activities or Games:

Tasting Stations

Encourage the kids to try new foods by setting up taste testing stations. Precut pieces of vegetables or fruits. Put them in bowls or cups labeled with their name. Have kids taste each and rate how they like it. Record the results on a class chart. If possible have a second of each item that is kept whole so the kids can see the fruit or vegetable.

You can add to the fun by having the items labeled with just a letter and have the kids guess what they are tasting. The whole vegetable or fruit can even be hidden under an upside down bowl or box.

Hot Potato Game

Play the Hot Potato game with a different fruit or vegetable.

Who Stole the... Game

Instead of "Who Stole the Cookie From the Cookie Jar?" substitute with "Who Stole the _____ (a fruit or veggie) From the Kitchen Counter?"

Snacks:

Fruit/Veggie Pita

Fresh fruits or veggies cut into small chunks stuffed in mini pitas (slice off small part of top to create opening)

Fruit kabobs

Use pretzel sticks poked into fruit chunks.

Nifty Kid-Friendly Sandwiches

Instead of bread - use thin slices of unpeeled, cored apple, mini rice cakes, mini waffles or mini pitas; For spreads – use almond butter, hummus, mashed avocado, mashed banana (use right away) or flavored cream cheese

Songs and Fingerplays:

Wind, Wind (Sung to: Row, Row, Row Your Boat")

Wind Tricks

Plastic Bag Kite

Materials Needed: Plastic bag, yarn

<u>Directions:</u> Tie length of yarn to handles of plastic bag. Glue streamers to other end.

Paper Bag Windsock

<u>Materials Needed:</u> Paper bags, streamers, yarn, glue or glue sticks, tape, and markers, paints or stickers

<u>Directions:</u> Cut out bottom of bag. Decorate bag with markers, paint or stickers. Attach streamers to one end of the bag. Fold other end of the bag in about an inch. Punch 3 holes (reinforce with tape then punch). Put yarn through holes and tie ends together. The children can run with their windsock and watch the streamers blow.

Activities or Games:

Feather in the Air

Pair you children off and give them a feather. Tell them to try to keep the feather in the air by blowing it. Explain that the air they are blowing out of their mouth is like the wind outside.

Wallpaper Kite

Cut out kites from wallpaper. Cut the kites in half. Have your children match the kite sides by the design.

Snacks:

<u>Windmill cookies</u> (purchased from local grocery store)

Book Title:

Themes or Topics to use it with: Rabbits, Family, Colors, Birthdays

Summary of program:

The bunnies each pick a favorite color to give Mom a very special birthday gift.

Paperbag Puppet

<u>Materials Needed</u>: Paper bags, scissors, glue, construction paper, markers, cotton ball <u>Directions</u>: Cut bunny ears, eyes, and nose from construction paper. Glue onto folded bottom of the bag. Draw on whiskers and bunny paws with markers. Glue cotton ball onto back of the bag for a tail.

Paper Plate Bunny

<u>Materials Needed:</u> One white paper plate, Crayons or colored markers, White construction paper, Pink pompom, Black yarn, Wiggle eyes, Cotton balls, Scissors, Stapler, Glue <u>Directions:</u> Fold the paper plate in half. Staple along the fold and half-way up each side of the plate. With your marker, draw a circle for the eye and draw the leg. Check our picture for reference. Glue the wiggle eye inside the circle that you drew. Glue a pink pompom to the left corner of the folded plate. Also glue three short pieces of black yarn for the whiskers. Glue a couple of cotton balls to the right hand corner of the plate. Cut two ears from the white construction paper. Make them extra long because they will become the handle to your basket. Color the inside of the ear pink, glue in place and then staple together at the top (to form the basket handle). That's it!

Activities or Games:

Bunny Hop

Find a cd recording with the Bunny Hop on it and let the children hop away.

Snacks:

Rabbit Food (Vegetables)

Give the children things rabbits like to eat: carrots, turnips, lettuce, cabbage. Make a chart of the food they liked and didn't like.

Jell-O Gigglers:

Make orange gigglers according to the directions on the Jell-o box and cut into carrot shapes.

Themes or Topics to use it with:

Color, teaching about different colors and identifying different colors.

Summary of program:

Teach the primary and secondary colors to children through story, songs and activities.

Stories that also work with this book/topic:

Zoe's Hats by Sharon Lane Holm
Dog's Colorful Day by Emma Dodd
Cat's Colors by Jane Cabrera
Wow Said the Owl by Tim Hopgood

Songs and Fingerplays:

Our Favorite Co	lors (Sung to the tune of "Mary Had a Little Lamb")
(Child's nan	e) has a favorite color,

Craft Ideas:

Shake and Paint!

<u>Materials Needed:</u> Large empty oatmeal container with lid, White paper, Broken crayon pieces, Different colored washable paint

<u>Directions:</u> Tape paper inside empty oatmeal container. Dip ends of broken crayons in paint. Put the crayons in the container and secure the lid on it. Have children shake container and/or roll it on the floor. When they finish, take the lid off and take the paper out and see their creation.

Activities or Games:

Color Walk

Go for a color walk around school or outside. Pick a specific color to look for and ask the children to say what they see that is that specific color. Have a piece of paper to write down the things as they make their observations.

The Color "Hokey Pokey"

Give each child different colored crepe paper streamers or tape different colors of crepe paper to the top of wide craft sticks. Give each child a streamer or stick with streamer. Sing the Hokey Pokey but sing the names of colors instead of body parts. The child or children with that color streamer will use it in the song.

"Put RED in, put RED out, put RED in and shake it all about. Do the Color Hokey Pokey and turn yourself around, That's what it's all about!"

Repeat with the other colors of streamers that they have.

Color of the Day

Assign each day that you meet a different color. Have children wear and/or bring something of that specific color to school. Talk about the color of the day and have students show what they are wearing that is the color of the day. Have them share the thing they brought for the color of the day.

Snacks:

Goldfish crackers

Get an assortment of colors of the goldfish crackers.

Color of the Day Snack

Have a snack that goes with the color of the day: oranges, apples, carrots, etc.

Craft Ideas:

Giraffe Collage

<u>Materials Needed:</u> Yellow and Brown Construction paper, Brown Paint, Paper Plate, Brown Yarn or small strips of paper, Pencil, Scissors, Glue, Black Marker

<u>Directions:</u> Trace foot with shoe on it onto yellow paper. Cut out two ears and two horns and a neck from yellow paper. Glue all giraffe pieces to a piece of brown construction paper. Trim giraffe's neck to fit paper. Put small amount of brown paint on paper plate. Dip finger in paint and put finger prints on giraffe to make spots. Cut small pieces of brown yarn (or) brown strips of paper and glue them along the giraffe's neck.

Activities or Games:

Giraffe Ring Toss

Make a giraffe head and neck from a cardboard wrapping paper tube and card stock. Mount it upright in a secure container. Have the children try to toss a plastic ring and get it around the giraffe's neck.

Cookie Cutter Match Game

Get cookie cutters of zoo animal shapes. Trace shape on single card or paper. Children have to match cookie cutter shape to traced shape.

Zoo Animal Picnic

Have each child bring a stuffed animal they might find in a zoo. Have a picnic or some snack, inside or outside and have them bring their animal along for the fun!

Book Title: <u>Little Owl's Night</u> by Divya Srinivasan

Themes or Topics to use it with: Owls, Nocturnal Animals, Fall/Winter Animals, Nighttime

Summary of program: Explore nocturnal animals. Use the book to see all the different animals that are awake at night & how many of the animals preschoolers usually think about are sleeping during this time.

Songs and Fingerplays:

Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star

If You Want to Be an Owl

Tune: "If You're Happy And You Know It"

If you want to be an owl, shout – Who! Who! If you want to be an owl, shout – Who! Who! Then you get to sleep all day And at night you get to play.

Trace Your Hand Owls

<u>Materials Needed:</u> 3 sheets (shades of grey & white or brown & orange depending on what type of owl) construction paper, scrap pieces of orange, black, & white or yellow construction paper, and 1 sheet of blue or black construction paper, black crayon or marker, pencil, scissors, glue <u>Directions:</u> Trace child's hand 4-6 times on grey/white or brown/orange paper, depending on how big their hands are. Cut out hands. Glue hands onto blue/black paper overlapping & so that the fingers are pointing downward & will be your feathers. Cut a 4-5 inch circle out of white or brown paper. Glue on for owl's face. Cut out two 2 inch circles from white or yellow paper for the eyes. Have child draw in black dot for center of eyes. Glue on orange triangle for beak & two narrow black triangles for feathers on owls head. You can cut a small black circle in half for the owl's feet.

Nighttime Animal Masks

<u>Materials Needed:</u> Construction paper or paper plate, crayons, markers, stickers, tissue paper <u>Directions:</u> Ask each child to choose from a list of animals that only come out at night, such as bats or owls. Give each child a round piece of construction paper with eye holes cut in it and have him decorate the mask to a nighttime animal of his choice. Once the children have all done so, ask the children to hold the masks up to their faces and pretend to be that animal for a few moments. Have the children discuss the different characteristics of those animals.

Activities or Games:

Night or Day Animal Sort

Create a sheet of paper halved vertically in the middle. On one half, have the children color it black and add white dots of paint for stars. On the other side, the child will color blue and add a yellow sun. Cut pictures from wildlife magazines and have the children glue them on either day or night based on if they are nocturnal.

Can You Find Your Way?

In an open space, free of danger, blind fold a child. Have that child follow a person either by sound or by movement. Discuss how animals of the night often use senses other than their sight.

Snacks:

Eat an Owl Snack

Create your very own edible owl by using a piece of round bologna for the head. Cut three triangles out of cheese for the two ears and the beak. Round crackers make the eyes. You can add an olive slice in the middle of the eye if desired.

Paper Plate Aquarium/Port Hole

<u>Materials Needed:</u> Paper plate, clear cellophane wrapping paper, 1 sheet blue construction paper, shapes cut from various colors construction paper, tape, glue, crayons

<u>Directions:</u> Cut center out of paper plate. Cut circle out of blue construction paper (slightly smaller than outside of paper plate). Cover hole in paper plate with clear cellophane; tape in place. Glue shapes onto blue circle. With crayons draw in faces, fins, tails & arms on ocean animals, as needed. Tape blue circle to the back of the paper plate so that it looks like you are looking through a port hole into the ocean or into an aquarium to see all the fish.

Tin Foil Fish Painting

<u>Materials Needed:</u> Construction paper, Tin foil, Scissors, Glue, Paint, Brush, Q-Tips, & Google Eyes (optional)

<u>Directions:</u> Cut out fish shape from center of construction paper (here is a good template: http://www.busybeekidscrafts.com/support-files/shinyfishtemplate.pdf). Cut a piece of tin foil a little smaller than the construction paper. Paint all over the foil using 1 color or many. Before the paint dries, use a Q-tip to wipe off some of the paint, letting a shiny design come through the paint. One the paint is dry, glue your foil to the construction paper. Glue on google eye use a small circle of white paper to make eyes.

Activities or Games:

Fish Games

Cut fish shapes of various sizes out of three different colors of posterboard. Let your children use the shapes for these games.

- Sort the fish by color or size
- Count the fish.
- Line up the fish from largest to smallest.

Snacks:

Aquarium Cups

Make blue gelatin and add canned fruit bits for pretend sea creatures. Serve in clear-plastic cups.

Graham Cracker Ocean

Cover a graham cracker with blue icing and put gold fish crackers and gummy sharks on it!
